FRAMEWORK

The Mathematics Curriculum has been drafted in keeping with the NSC (STEM) and CXC (CSEC) programmes. Please note that the CXC (CSEC) Mathematics Examination which will be administered at the end of grade 11 is **NOT** examined only on grades 10 and 11 objectives. It is examined on the entire five (5) years of work.

Mathematics Department believes that proficiency in most of mathematics is not an inborn characteristic; it is a consequence of persistence, effort, practice, support, encouragement and effective instruction. The use of the curriculum will allow all stakeholders: teachers, parents and students to effectively and efficiently execute the programme.
